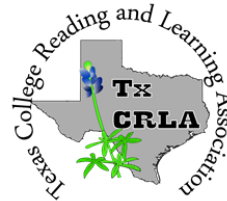


CASP

Texas is unique in the country because of its close partnership between the Texas Chapter of the College Reading and Learning Association, TxCRLA, and the Texas Association for Developmental Education, TADE. Since 1979, the organizations led by the officers of each organization as the CASP Board have sponsored a CASP Conference, the College Academic Success Programs Conference. A highlight of the conferences has been the opportunity to honor the work of Texas higher educators who have made significant contributions to the fields of Developmental Education and Learning Support and to support the professional development and academic scholarship of practitioners.

CASP Lifetime Achievement Award

The CASP Lifetime Achievement Award is designed to recognize an individual for outstanding contributions to the field of developmental education and/or to the field of learning assistance and to TxCRLA and/or TADE. Award winners must meet the following qualifications:

- ⇒ The applicant must have at least 20 years of service in developmental education and/or learning assistance.
- ⇒ The applicant must have been a member of TxCRLA and/or TADE for at least ten years and have made significant contributions to either or both of the organizations.
- ⇒ Current TxCRLA, TADE, or CASP Board Members are ineligible for this award.

Former Honorees



Dr. Carol Dochen is the Director of the Texas State Student Learning Resources Center and was honored in 2013. She was the first and second president of TADE, CASP Historian since 1979, and served as a site co-chair for five Austin conferences. Dr. Dochen is the co-author of the textbook, *Academic Transformation: The Road to College Success*.



Dr. Rebecca Goosen is Associate Vice Chancellor for College Preparatory at San Jacinto College and was honored in 2013. She has been an active member of TADE and TxCRLA, and she served as the President of NADE in 2012. Dr. Goosen has been honored with several national recognitions who is fierce advocate of developmental education and learning support.



Dr. Rosemary Karr teaches developmental mathematics at Collin College and was honored in 2012. She held several TADE offices before serving as NADE President. She is the author of three developmental mathematics textbooks as well as numerous instruction manuals, solution manuals, papers, and videos. She also was recognized as a U.S. Professor of the Year.



Dr. Claire Ellen Weinstein, noted Professor of Psychology at the University of Texas at Austin, was honored with this award in 2010. One of the original members of TADE and TxCRLA, Dr. Weinstein has authored over 100 publications including the LASSI, *Learning and Study Skills Inventory*, which is used by over 65% of the colleges and universities in the country.



Dr. Russ Hodges was honored with this award in 2008. Dr. Hodges is a Texas State University Professor, former President of CRLA, former CLADEA Chair, and co-site chair of five Austin conferences. He has authored many outstanding articles and is the co-author of the textbook, *Academic Transformation: The Road to College Success*.

Janith Stephenson was the first honoree in 2005. Before she retired from the College of the Mainland, she was the creator of the original CASP Listserv and very active CASP Board member.

CASP Presidents' Award

This award was created last year to honor individuals who have made significant contributions to Texas higher educators through work with the TADE and TxCRLA organizations.

TxCRLA Developmental Educator of the Year Award

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This award is given to a person in the field of education who has made a major contribution to the field of Developmental Education during the previous year.

TADE Professional Development Scholarship

This annual award for \$500 is given to one or more TADE members in good standing for professional development fees or to travel to professional development events. Winners will be recognized at the CASP Conference.

TxCRLA Gladys R. Shaw Professional Development Award

Current TxCRLA members may apply for a \$500 award, which is to support their travel to professional development opportunities related to learning assistance and/or developmental education.

The award is named in honor of **Gladys R. Shaw**, who was Director of the Student Support Services Program at the University of Texas at El Paso for many years. Shaw was a champion in the field of developmental education and traced her passion back to her own personal experience. “I was a first-generation-college, low-income farm girl myself who earned a scholarship that went with the valedictorian designation for my high school graduating class,” she described when the award was created in 2008. Because she married her high school sweetheart before graduation, she was unable to accept the award. That never stopped her from pursuing her bachelor’s and master’s degrees.

Although Shaw worked in the business world, she found her passion in developmental education, and her excellent work was honored with many recognitions including being named CLADEA Fellow. She served as TADE President and Treasurer, and was also subsequently Treasurer of both CRLA and NADE, and CASP Conference Treasurer in 2009. Shaw wrote and co-authored many books, chapters, journal articles and other publications which enriched the field of developmental education, but she also mentored many educators not only in Texas but across the country.

TxCRLA Ann B. Faulkner Professional Development Award

This award was established in 1994. TxCRLA members may apply for up to \$500, which can be used for professional development or research related to learning assistance and/or professional development. Winners have used the award for graduate study, attendance at professional conferences, or attendance at longer institutes such as TIDE or the Kellogg Institute.

Previous winners include M.E. McWilliams, Director of the Academic Assistance and Resource Center of Stephen F. Austin State University. She attended TIDE with the aim of building math online lab and other technology projects in 2008. Executive Director of the First Year Experience at Angelo State University's Sara Weertz used her scholarship to attend the national CRLA conference in 2007. The Writing/Languages Coordinator of the University of Texas Tutoring and Learning Center Virginia Heidemann used her scholarship to pursue her doctoral studies in 2006.

The TxCRLA Claire-Ellen Weinstein Graduate Student Award

This award is given annually to a full-time Texas graduate student doing research in the field of developmental education or learning assistance. Winners receive a \$500 scholarship and a one-year membership to TxCRLA.

The scholarship was named in 2011 for **Dr. Claire Ellen Weinstein**, who is a professor of Educational Psychology at the University of Texas in Austin. Weinstein has been a member of CASP since the beginning of the organization, and CASP attendees have benefited from her presentations and workshops for many years. Her Model of Strategic Learning has been extremely useful for teachers of all levels as they develop educational programs and diagnostic assessments in schools, colleges, and business/government settings. She has written over 100 publications, including an assessment called the Learning And Study Skills Inventory (LASSI), which is used in more than 65% of the colleges and universities in the country. Her learning strategies course at the University of Texas at Austin has won recognition because of its highly successful intervention and retention-to-graduation of at-risk students.

TADE Carol Dochen Professional Development Scholarship

This scholarship is awarded to one or more TADE members in good standing and must be used for professional development. The professional development may include travel or conference attendance, or a project or research not funded by the applicant's institution (does not apply to degree research).

A written report should be sent to the organization president so members can learn how monies were expended and how the award enhanced the member's professional development.
